





Note from the Board of Directors

As Project Children celebrates its 50th anniversary this year, the Mulcahy Scholarship Program is committed to deepening connections between Irish American youth and their heritage through meaningful experiences and events.

Our Board of Directors were handed the arduous task of narrowing down the talented applicant pool, as the submissions were extremely strong again this year. It is heartening to know that the younger generation continues to offer a fresh perspective and holds immense potential to shape a prosperous future for us all, all while emulating the basis of the Mulcahy family way. Our recipients showed an abundance of leadership qualities, all while sharing an enthusiasm to explore their Irish heritage.

In March, we proudly awarded the Mulcahy Scholarships to Luke Connolly, Cora Harrigan, Brooklyn O'Brien, Celia Ramos, and Carlo Scotto during the screening of the documentary *How to Defuse a Bomb: The Project Children Story* at the AOH Division 18 in Peekskill. This event was particularly meaningful for our Scholars, helping them understand the origins and inspiring legacy of the program.

In July, the Scholars visited the Consulate General of Ireland in New York and met with Deputy Consul General Gareth Hargadon to learn more about Ireland's work abroad and its support for the Irish diaspora worldwide. They also had the privilege of a roundtable discussion with Ambassador Fergal Mythen at the Permanent Mission of Ireland to the United Nations. Thanks to Aisling McDonagh, Communications and Public Diplomacy Lead at the Mission, we also toured the United Nation, including the Security Council room. The conversation with Ambassador Mythen highlighted the crucial role cultural exchange plays in promoting peace and understanding, inspiring our scholars with a renewed commitment to the scholarship's mission of fostering connection and reconciliation.

Our scholars spent two transformative weeks at the Celtic Irish American Academy in Galway, under the expert guidance of Brian Fahy and his daughter, Dr. Johanna Clancy. During their stay, students engaged in a rich program combining Irish language lessons, history workshops, traditional music and dance sessions, and entrepreneurship seminars. They explored Galway's vibrant cultural scene, connected with local communities, and participated in outdoor activities that deepened their appreciation of Ireland's landscape and heritage. This immersive experience empowered scholars to develop a stronger sense of identity, leadership skills, and lifelong friendships.

The Mulcahy Scholarship was launched in 2018 by the Aisling Irish Community Center, Yonkers, New York, in tribute to Denis and Miriam Mulcahy, and their family's commitment to Project Children, a charity that for forty years, worked untiringly to change the lives of children across Northern Ireland. Project Children provided each child a 6-week summer reprieve from the violence of "the Troubles". Nearly fifty years later, the scholarship is proud to replicate the reverse, by providing American high school students the opportunity to experience firsthand their Irish culture in a fun and diverse way. It is our way of thanking the 16,000 US host families for opening their doors, when the children of Northern Ireland needed them most.

Our board are delighted with the growing interest in our scholarship program, and we will continue our endeavor to offer Irish American high school students the chance to explore their Irish heritage. We would like to extend our thanks to all our donors, as well as Brian Fahy and Dr. Johanna Clancy, Directors of the CIAA, and their host families.



The Mulcahy Scholarship was easily one of the best experiences I've ever had the opportunity to enjoy due to it allowing me an amazing two weeks where I learnt so much. I first met the other Scholars during a viewing of the documentary How to Defuse A Bomb, which recounts how Denis Mulcahy started Project Children to help children in Northern Ireland during the Troubles. Not only did I learn the inspiring story of how Project Children changed people's lives, I met the four other scholars who I would develop special friendships within time to come. This idea of the unique friendship between Ireland and America bonding them on the level of individual families helping the other was the core of Project Children and now the Mulcahy Scholarship.

We were generously hosted by amazing families once we all arrived in Galway, and I felt so welcome and accepted as soon as I walked through the door. Our host family always provided us with delicious food and their conversations with us taught more about modern Irish life than I could've ever anticipated. Our time in the classroom was far different than any other classroom experience I've had before: not focused on homework but instead on truly grasping a culture. We received lessons in Irish from students in St. Enda's College, and it inspired me to pursue learning Irish fully. My favorite part, however, was when we learnt about Irish history with Brian Fahy, and we listened to Rebel songs, saw Famine art, and got a view into Irish identity I never saw before. I'd heard "Fields of Athenry" in the past, but never did I hear it the same once I'd understood the pain and reality of its Famine context. Overall, our time in the class covered many different aspects of Irish culture that I'd never enjoyed before, be it instruments, history, literature, or language, and I learnt so much about Ireland and my own interests through our study.

We also explored Ireland outside St. Enda's as well, going on many trips around Galway and Connemara. As a New Yorker accustomed to the concrete jungle, the majesty of the Cliffs of Moher surpassed even the Empire State Building and it left an indelible mark on my mind. I was also very impressed by the University of Galway, and the demo courses we received there helped me imagine college life and made me consider going to Ireland to study full-time. I love soccer, but after playing Gaelic Football with a former All-Ireland player and winning a Galway jersey, I found a new sport to enjoy as well. The most daunting of all our expeditions, in my opinion, was Black Rock, the name of the diving pier on Salthill. Diving 33 feet into the icy Irish sea was terrifying, especially due to my fear of heights, but I still did it anyway and conquered my fear. While not a crazy feat, it symbolizes the core of this trip for me: a leap of faith. I had never gotten the chance to be away from home for as long as I did, travel as far, or meet as many new people as with the Mulcahy Scholarship. And, while daunting, I am endlessly grateful for the chance to have taken that leap of faith because it was the most rewarding chance in my 17 years of life.

I want to deeply thank Linda Croston, the Aisling Irish Center, the other Scholars, and of course Mr. Mulcahy for the amazing opportunity and time I had with the Mulcahy Scholarship. I cannot give a higher recommendation for the Mulcahy Scholarship and encourage anyone to apply for this chance too!



During our two weeks in Ireland, we got to experience so many amazing things. Each day started with mornings at St. Enda's College, followed by afternoons filled with new experiences such as playing Irish sports, learning traditional music and dancing, and exploring Galway's Shop Street to enjoy the lively street performances. Every activity gave us a deeper appreciation for Irish culture and the warm, welcoming spirit of the people we met.

We also had the chance to hear from inspiring speakers and leaders. At Portershed, three young entrepreneurs shared their journeys and how they built their businesses. Pat Ward told us about his path from serving in the Navy to starting his own company, and Mayor Cubbard spoke about what it's like to serve the people of Galway. Hearing their stories made me realize how important it is to take chances, work hard, and give back to your community.

Thanks to the Mulcahy Scholarship, I was able to make new friends from around the world and step outside my comfort zone. This experience taught me to be open to new opportunities, to appreciate my Irish roots, and to see the value of bringing people together. Just like Project Children has done for so many years.

I am so grateful for this life-changing experience and to everyone who made it possible. It's something I'll never forget.
